Dear Franklin & Marshall Community,

We write this message in solidarity with the queer and trans members of our community at a time when <u>LGBTQ+ rights are threatened from many sides</u>, and at a time when <u>trans lives are especially under attack</u>.

We write to affirm the value and dignity of these members of our community. Trans lives matter.

Consequently, the undersigned faculty and staff at Franklin & Marshall College unequivocally denounce the choice to invite transphobic speaker Paula Scanlan to our campus on March 27, in close proximity to Transgender Day of Visibility.

Scanlan is currently on a college speaking tour and is working with a well-funded, far-right "culture war" machine that seeks to sow division, provoke backlash, generate publicity, and weaken public confidence in higher education. In videos of her campus visits available online, we have seen Scanlan disrespect, misgender, and mock trans people. Scanlan also has a history of (a) invoking the unsubstantiated idea that the presence of transgender women creates a threat of sexual violence to cisgender women, and (b) making direct reference to the physical appearance of Lia Thomas's genitalia. The latter would, of course, never be considered an appropriate thing to do in reference to anyone but a transgender person; unfortunately, trans people are not afforded the same dignities that everyone else can take for granted.

Scanlan refuses to acknowledge the identity of the trans community; indeed, the title of her talk, "Biological Men Should Not Compete in Women's Sports," <u>attempts to erase the existence of trans women, the purported subject of her speech</u>. We believe, based on this evidence, that the goal of her college tour is not the civil, academic discussion of ideas. We maintain that its content is dehumanizing and cruel. Accordingly, we are deeply concerned about this talk's impact on our community, and in particular on our trans and non-binary students.

Our community has lost many cherished LGBTQ+ members over the years, and in recent weeks we have lost a beloved trans student, writer, and activist. We mourn alongside the family members, friends, and allies most affected during this painful time. We also recognize the large and growing body of evidence² that shows a direct correlation between the anti-trans rhetoric

promulgated by Scanlan and others and the violence perpetrated against trans people. There is a causal relationship between casual and institutional transphobia and trans death.

In light of these recent and ongoing tragedies, members of our community have called for greater care and common decency toward each other. Some have suggested that Scanlan's talk be postponed or canceled; that is not the purpose of this letter, however. We maintain that a liberal arts college should be a space for the free exchange of ideas, but we also maintain that such exchanges should be conducted in a manner that is civil and that respects all members of our community.

Part of our work as an institution of higher education is to study ideas, even when those ideas are troubling and sad. However, we should never agree with the choice to invite speakers to campus whose demonstrated aim is to demean, devalue, and threaten the lives of our friends, family, and community members. We believe that our role as a college community *must* include speaking out against such dehumanization.

To the queer, trans, and nonbinary members of our community: you have allies on this campus who value and support you. We are committed to fighting alongside you.

To President Altmann and the F&M administration: we call on you to make a strong, unequivocal statement of care and support on behalf of all of our LGBTQ+ students, colleagues, and community members.
